

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FROM BOY TO BLUE EXCERPT...

"... No matter what we do for a living, everyone knows that any day could be our last. It could be that we get hit by a bus while crossing the street, we could have a sudden heart attack, a drunk driver could T-bone us at any of the many intersections we cross through each day, and in one second we're dead. This isn't something most people spend a lot of time thinking about. Sure, once in a while we read about some poor family driving down the highway when a bridge dislodges and falls on their car at the exact second they are crossing under it. For a moment, we all say, "Man, that could have been me." But that thought lasts about as long as a prom night sexcapade.

Being a cop, however, begins with a simple and undeniable fact: This could be the last day of my life. Police officers are forced to spend a great deal of time with their own mortality. It starts in the academy where they subject new officers to a string of stories and videos showing cops being killed in the line of duty. I thought about my death every time I dressed for work. I have a wooden rosary that I believe was given to me by an angel.

I was at a particularly difficult time in my life personally. I had arrested this woman for identity theft. She was an illegal immigrant using someone's social security number. But, the day after I arrested her, she posted bond and came to visit me. She thanked me for doing my job, and said she felt I was struggling. She brought me a wooden rosary and a bracelet with the different saints on it. She gave me a hug, told me I was being guarded and protected, and gave me these trinkets to remind me of that every day. I never saw that woman again.

As I got dressed for work every night, it's when I put the rosary on I said, "I hope tonight isn't the night, but if it is, I hope it's fast." Throughout the night, I'd be reminded I was wearing it because when I moved, it often shifted under my ballistic vest, poking me slightly. It's in these moments I remembered how vulnerable I was. I knew even the simplest of calls could snowball out of control in microseconds and I could be dead.

TWENTY-ONE GUN SALUTE

"I HOPE TONIGHT ISN'T THE NIGHT, BUT IF IT IS, I HOPE ITS FAST."

We had an officer who had arrested a juvenile in an alley after witnessing the suspect breaking into cars. He transmitted

over the radio that he had the suspect in custody. A few moments later the officer was killed after the juvenile produced a handgun and shot the officer in the chest. His ballistic vest stopped the first few rounds. Then, the boy stood over the officer and shot him twice in his head, killing him. The officer was survived by his expecting wife.

FROM BOY TO BLUE EXCERPT CONT...

No matter what call I went on, there was always a little voice asking if today could be the day that I'd have to make the ultimate sacrifice. Strangely, I usually wasn't scared during the course of my workday. Things evolved and happened so quickly that most of the time, in the moment, there was no time to be scared. When there was an incident where I could have been seriously hurt or killed, I didn't reflect on that fact until after everything was over. It was in that reflection I'd sometimes mumble out loud, "I was almost killed." I often have flashbacks of the many times on the job I believe I was close to death. Fortunately, I'm still here, but there have been many others who weren't so lucky.

When you take into account the tremendous responsibility your law enforcement officers undertake every day, the training they receive, the atrocities they must bear witness to, and the tremendous job they do, it's impossible not to be grateful to the men and women who are keeping us all safe.

Even more terrifying is the many officers who are now being targeted and killed for no other reason than they are police officers. These cowardly murderers are ambushing officers oftentimes who aren't even on a call. No matter what the case, any officer who dies in the line of duty should be considered among the highest of tragedies and a threat to America's very way of life. It is the men and women in blue who prevent anarchy, chaos, and violence from overwhelming our society..."

INTERVIEW

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: What inspired you to write From Boy To Blue?

A: When I first started out, I got to talking with more experienced or retired cops, who always wished they had written down their stories of their time on the job. So I followed that advice and kept a journal. While serving in the media relations department, I discovered the source of disconnect between police and the public: a simple lack of understanding. And in order to share this new message, I needed to expose myself to a platform that wasn't so constrained by my duties as an officer. That's when I began to transform my journal into a book that would help heal the divide and make encounters between citizens and cops safer. That's when I realized my job in law enforcement wasn't over, it was just beginning. Q: What do you hope to accomplish by publishing your memoir?

A: I hope that America reads it. I hope that this war on cops will end. I hope that the American people and cops can begin to trust each other again, and not believe in any of this skewed controversy. I want people to call the police, knowing they'll be safe.

Q: What else do you talk about in your book besides stories of criminals and take-downs?

A: There's a lot in here. I go through getting hired, to the actual education we get in training. I go through the process of getting a 9-1-1 call, responding to it, filing a report, even going to court. I go through what the public might think they see in certain encounters vs. what is actually happening. I talk about controversial and hotbutton topics- those questions everyone's always wanting to ask the cops they come across. From traffic stops to bar fights, it's all in here.
